## Regency Record - what you need to know

As described on the front page, starting with the next issue, *Regency Record*, is becoming a predominantly on-line publication. We will continue to send out news and information via Newsbriefs and Alerts to all residents for whom we have email addresses. Alerts contain information and advice about emergencies or other time sensitive information. Past Alerts have covered such matters as weather and utility events, burglaries and even lost pets.

Following the directions below (in the form of questions and answers) will enable you to continue to receive *Regency Record* and other communications from RECA.

## How will I know when a new issue of *Regency Record* is available?

If we have your email address, we'll send you an email to let you know.

## I currently receive RECA Newsbriefs and Alerts by email. Do I need to do anything?

No. You do not need to do anything unless you change your email address, which is discussed in this article.

## What should I do if *Regency Record* is delivered to my door, but I do not receive any emails from RECA.

This means that we do not have your email address. Please go to the 'Contact Us' page on our web site, www.regencyestates.org/contactus.html and provide us with your contact information and we'll add you to our mailing list.

## I don't have a email and internet access. How to I continue to receive *Regency Record*?

To receive print versions of *Regency Record*, you'll need to let us know. The easiest way is if you can have someone complete the form on the 'Contact Us' page on the RECA web site. The alternative is to write to us at:

Unfortunately, you won't be able to receive RECA Newsbriefs and Alerts unless we have an email address for you.

### What do I do if I change my email address?

There are two alternatives - you can either notify us through the 'Contact Us' page on the RECA web site or follow the self-service directions (Update Profile/Email Address) on the very bottom of any Newsbrief of Alert email from RECA.

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## How will classified ads and requests for neighborhood service providers work?

At present classified ads and information on neighborhood providers are removed from the version of *Regency Record* that is available from the RECA web site for privacy reasons. Going forward, we will publish classified ads in the online version of *Regency Record*. We will ask anyone interested in contacting an advertiser to complete the 'Contact Us' form on the RECA web site. We will then provide the contact information of the advertiser by return.

If you want to find a neighborhood services provider, you will also need to complete the 'Contact Us' form on the RECA web site (specifying the type of service requested), and we'll provide you with service provider contact information by return.

## Proposed Elimination of Route 42 Gets a Big Reaction from RECA Residents

There was a big reaction from RECA residents about the proposed elimination of the Ride On Route 42 that runs between White Flint and Montgomery Mall. Route 42 is the only bus service through Regency Estates and represents a lifeline for many residents, including students, the elderly and others without motor vehicles.



The County held two public forums, one on September 17 in Germantown and the other on September 24 in Rockville. Jerry Garson, RECA's Treasurer, testified on behalf of RECA against the proposed elimination at the Germantown forum. In addition to representations made by RECA residents, we are aware the local politicians are also very supportive of the efforts to retain the service. Breaking news on this subject will be delivered when we hear anything about the outcome.

## Winston Churchill High School Playing Field News?

In case you were wondering about the status of the proposed artificial turf on the Churchill field and the proposed private/public partnership that RECA objects to – it's gone very quiet, presumably because of the pending litigation. Should we hear anything, we'll of course let you know!

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## **Pedestrian Crossing comes to Victory Lane**

If you've driven on Victory Lane by Churchill High School recently, you might have noticed that there is a new pedestrian crosswalk by the exit of the carpool loop on Greenlane Drive. This pedestrian crosswalk, which was constructed over the school break, was meant be built over a year ago after a student was run over on Victory Lane.

The crosswalk has resulted in the road being narrowed to simultaneously accommodate only one vehicle in each direction. The reduction in road width has miraculously not resulted in more congestion on Victory Lane during drop off and pick up times, though the change in school hours that started this school year may have helped.

It's still important to realize that each year in Montgomery County more than 400 crashes have occurred involving pedestrians. Teenagers ages 15 through 19 make up 51% of all underage pedestrian fatalities, putting Maryland is in the top 10 with the greatest number of pedestrian fatalities among ages 12 and 19.

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With the gradual shortening of the days and the start of the new school year, there are some reminders about safety for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers from the County and MCPS later on in this issue.

## **Parking Permit Fiasco**

Those of you that live in the immediate vicinity of Winston Churchill High School (WCHS) and require residential parking permits will be all too painfully aware of the recent changes imposed by the County.

Some history – the permit system was established in Regency Estates to deter students of WCHS from parking on residential streets around the school. Without the permitting system, residents would quickly find it difficult to park on the road outside their residence and even challenging to drive on the roads due to parked vehicles. Those of you who experienced the congestion during the recent "back to school" night at WCHS would have got a taste for the potential pandemonium.

In the past, residents have received an application for permit renewals in the mail every other year during September. Upon paying the fee and providing proof of vehicle ownership, a resident received a decal, valid for two years to put in each vehicle. One visitor card per address was also available for use with service providers, guests, family, etc. parked on the street while visiting residents.

The permitting system, was abused by some residents who lent (and sometimes charged) students for either the permanent residential or visitor permits. Fortunately, the abuse was easily detected, both by vigilant residents and parking enforcement.

Fast forward to now. Beginning October 1, the County transitioned to an all-digital parking permit process. With the new system the decal permits are gone, replaced with online registration and "digital residential parking permits". Instead of a two-year registration, the permits are renewed annually. While we don't know about the motivation for the change, we can speculate that outsourcing the permitting process to a private business saves the County money in some way.

The same residency checks that were performed under the old system are still performed now. That means that the digital permits can only be issued for vehicles that are registered at the address of the resident in Regency Estates.

Visitor permits are also "digital". This means that once a resident has signed up for their one allocated visitor permit, there are two ways for them to assign it to a visitor's vehicle – by entering the vehicle tag information on the digital permit web site, or by calling the call center number.

While the permit fees remained the same, the new system has significant enforcement issues.

 It is now impossible for residents to determine if a vehicle is parked illegally or not. Only parking enforcement has a record of vehicle tags of authorized vehicles.

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- Whereas the old visitor permits were only meant for a few hours, the digital visitor permits are valid for 7 days. Once the permit assignment expires after 7 days, or if it needs to be reassigned to another visitor it that time, it must be reassigned via web site or phone call. There is no limit to the number of renewals for the same vehicle. This means that a resident could (assuming they don't need the visitor permit for any other reason) quite legally let a WCHS use the permit. Hypothetically if each resident allocated their visitor permit to a student, we would be not much better off than not having (and paying for) the permitting system at all.
- To make matters worse, the process of assigning and reassigning the visitor permit is unduly onerous, requiring a phone call or a computer. There is no mobile app and the rendering of the web site on a smartphone is not any different what you would see on a laptop. Putting a card in a car window is low tech but more convenient!

The RECA Board is going to do whatever necessary to ensure that the visitor permitting process is as straightforward as it was before the change. There was nothing wrong with the visitor permit card – indeed it was a better solution than what we now have to contend with. Stay tuned for more developments.

## Pepco pillaging in Potomac

Editor's note: Pepco's power lines cut northwest to southeast through Regency Estates in a wide, rarely-mowed ribbon that bisects our community. Postoak Road, Gainsborough Road and Tuckerman Lane intersect these fields. To the east, flanking the Pepco property, are dozens of homes on Wild Olive Drive, Enid Drive and Court, Castlewood Court, Deborah Drive and Court, and Redbud Court. On the west side are homes on Tifton Drive and Court, Greenlane Drive, parts of Regency Drive and Georgetown Drive and Court,

Giant metal power-transmission towers (some showing serious signs of rust) run along these fields and – closer to residents' homes – are wooden electrical distribution poles.

In a bad storm, the lines on these shorter poles are subject to damage if a tree limb falls on them.

After years of neglected maintenance, a string of power outages affecting thousands of Marylanders, and new-found indignation among state legislators, Pepco was spurred into action by new regulations from the state Public Service Commission. The company launched a vigorous "vegetation management program", trimming and cutting down trees throughout its service area, including Regency Estates and neighboring communities. The zeal with which the tree-removal program was carried out led many to characterize the effort as overly aggressive. In some areas, irate citizens attempted to physically block this work in hopes of preserving a beloved maple, oak or evergreen, a practice that Pepco officials found to be expensive, dangerous and very bad for public relations.

And so it came to pass that on June 19, 2015, a preemptive "Formal Notice to Cease and Desist" was signed by Pepco Deputy General Counsel Jack E. Strausman and mailed together with a less-onerous missive from Pepco President Donna Cooper – to Regency Estates residents whose homes border this swath of its property. The notice warned our neighbors against interfering with the vegetation management work undertaken to comply with state regulations. "Because you are the owner and control who may enter and remain on your propert,", the notice scolded, "you bear the responsibility for any encroachment on Pepco's easement rights."

In July, the Asplundh trucks and crews came to the westward side of the power line fields. The following article reflects the experiences of one Regency Estates family.

Like many residents on Tifton Drive, we received a notice in June attached to our door that Pepco would be performing, "Routine scheduled pruning," and "Complete tree removal." No time frame nor explanation was provided on what would be pruned and/or removed. I felt that we had dodged the tree-destruction bullet when Pepco worked on the street side of Tifton Drive in 2014 and the start of 2015 so I wasn't so worried with this notice that focused on the houses adjacent to the Pepco easement/right-of-way.

Despite the horror stories I read in the *Washington Post* about victims of Pepco's aggressive (yet legal) tree trimming/removal I was not concerned about our back yard that abuts the Pepco easement. None of our trees were near the main power lines and we only had Leyland Cypress (on our property line) and an apple tree and another large tree well inside our property line that were about 15 feet from the local power line.

In July, the work on the Pepco-easement side of Tifton started and quickly deteriorated into rape and destruction. As the work crew approached our backyard we insisted on talking to the crew supervisor about what they planned to do in the futile hope that we could protect some of our privacy as well as shielding us from the harsh view of the power lines and poles. No such luck! To add insult to injury, Pepco had Montgomery County armed police with the work crew to intimidate any residents who may have objected to this destruction of greenery.

Thirteen trees later, we lost all of our privacy and gained tree stumps, a full view of the Pepco easement, power lines and poles, and the promise of a voucher to replace the trees that were removed from our property. We were informed by the work crew that the supervisor would be by the following day with the vouchers for replanting.

The following day I asked the work crew to have the supervisor come see me, which they promised to do. The supervisor did not come by that day so I contacted Pepco by email requesting information on the vouchers. The automated response informed me that they would reply to me "soon". The following day the supervisor came to our front door with a voucher redeemable at Stadler's Nursery (Rte 108 in Laytonsville) for \$2,600 based on \$200 per tree for 13 trees. This was not negotiable and 15 year-old Leyland Cypresses were worth the same as the other two 50 year-old trees that had been cut down.

As a follow-up we have selected the trees to replace those removed and we are awaiting Miss Utility to approve the planting sites. A few things about the vouchers:

 \$2,600 seems like a lot of money until you see the price of 6 and 8 foot trees at the nursery;

- trees that grow larger than 40-feet are excluded;
- the nursery (which was very helpful and familiar with the voucher process/limitations) does the planting but there is nothing for stump removal/grinding; and
- the voucher (I received) expires at the end of 2015.

## HOW TO OBTAIN A VOUCHER FOR THE TREES REMOVED FROM YOUR YARD

To start the process to obtain a voucher for the trees removed from your property you have to contact Pepco. Use the "Contact Us Online", fill in the requested data and use the "General Inquiry" section with "Tree Vouchers" in the other comment section.

You will get a "we're unusually busy" response so be patient. If they do not reply to you within a week try Customer Service at (202) 833-7500 and ask for a customer service representative. As my wife and I were physically present when the trees were removed and they knew we expected the promised voucher, things went rather smoothly for us. After the fact now, it may not be as easy but you should be able to prove the number of trees removed (photograph the stumps) and that they were on your property and not Pepco's (another photograph).

## Helping our planet, starting in Regency Estates

Our pollinators such as Monarch butterflies and bees are in deep trouble, with numbers declining rapidly. What is it we can do to help? The first easy thing is to decide to stop spraying our lawns and plants with and pesticides herbicides

These products, marketed by the major chemical manufacturers, have contributed to a destruction of approximately 150 million acres in Milkweed filled Monarch habitat. One herbicide in particular, Roundup, may also have adverse effects on humans too. The World Health Organization recently alleged that Glyphosate could be a carcinogenic to humans.

Other pesticides, called neonicotinoids or neonics, have put America's food supply in some jeopardy. Populations of honey bees are attracted to this poison because it has nicotine-like effect on that brain cells. This prevents them from navigating properly and from hive building.

Montgomery County Council is currently considering a bill to restrict the use of pesticides on private lawns and public land. In particular, the bill would ban non-essential or cosmetic pesticides that are not banned by federal or state governments but contain chemicals that may be carcinogens based on the findings of the Environmental Protection Agency. On the other hand, organic treatments would be encouraged.

The mental leap from understanding the havoc that pesticides and herbicides can bring to insects, food, and human health should lead you to seriously consider not to use toxic chemicals on your own bit of green space.

Regardless of whether the bill is passed or not, you are encouraged to do your part by not using chemicals on your lawn and in your garden that are dangerous to insects and humans alike.

## How Much More in Taxes Would You Be Willing to Pay to Take a Bus?

The following article discusses the County government's efforts to impose higher taxes on residents and businesses by creating an Independent Transit Authority (ITA). The County Transit Task Force released a draft report on September 19, 2015 recommending changes to the County Executive in his bill previously submitted to the State Legislature that would create the ITA. Because the ITA could add billions to the tax burden of County taxpayers, this is a significant issue affecting our communities for decades into the future. http://www.montgomerycountymd.gov/transittask-force-2015/report.html

To address current and future transportation concerns, the County is currently pursuing a large number of transportation/transit projects (the Purple Line light rail, the Corridor Cities Transitway or CCT, and ten Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) routes as well as a new six-mile highway (the M83) that will each cost billions of additional tax dollars to construct, maintain, and operate. Competing with these new projects for funding are existing roads and bridges that need repairs and replacement as well as the regional WMATA subway and bus services and the County's Ride On local bus service.

Furthermore, there are other community needs such as schools, public safety, health care, affordable housing, libraries and cultural facilities, and parks and recreation to consider in terms of what County taxpayers are expected to fund through the many types of taxes paid to live and work here. The County is at its maximum limits for income and property taxes, a situation which County Finance Director Joe Beach described as being "under pressure" in terms of increasing expenditures and looking for new revenue sources to maintain current obligations.

The County's approved operating budget for Fiscal Year 2016 (which started on July 1, 2015) was \$5.08 billion. As a point of comparison, the State of Delaware's FY2016 recommended operating budget is only \$3.9 billion.

Because of an expected revenue shortfall, the County government has already reduced this current budget by \$54 million. It is projected that this situation will continue for at least the next two years with the County's revenue falling by more than \$150 million in FY15-17 and \$250 million in FY15-18. Consequently, the County Executive has already begun warning that there will be a substantial future increase in property taxes just to maintain the County's current level of spending.

The Tax Foundation www.taxfoundation.org prepares annual comparisons of the relative tax burdens for each of the states. In its most recent report, Maryland is considered to have the 40<sup>th</sup> worst business tax climate. However, among the different types of taxes included in this analysis, the two main categories driving this ranking are personal income taxes (46<sup>th</sup> worst) and property taxes (41<sup>st</sup> worst). The Foundation estimates that the current combined state and local tax burden for Maryland residents is the 7<sup>th</sup> highest in the country.

### The Independent Transit Authority (ITA)

Since both Federal and State funding for transportation and other public facilities and services are also being constrained, the County is challenged to find funding for all of the new transit projects that it wants to build. Consequently, the County Executive requested new state legislation (MC-24-15) last January that would allow the County to create an Independent Transit Authority (ITA).

A public hearing for the ITA bill was scheduled by the County's State Legislative Delegation one week after its introduction on the following Friday. Due to requests by citizens, the hearing was moved from Annapolis to Rockville and rescheduled from Friday afternoon to Friday evening. Despite this short notice, the Council's auditorium was filled to standing room only as citizens and union members turned out to protest the bill's provisions. It became apparent that this proposal had been introduced without any input by the County Council, the union, or the public.

Consequently, the County Executive responded to this outpouring of opposition by withdrawing the bill for that Legislative Session. However, he also declared his intention to submit the ITA bill in next year's Session if there are no

other alternatives identified for funding the planned BRT routes.

#### The Transit Task Force

To this end, on April 6th the County Executive reactivated the Transit Task Force that in 2012 had originally recommended the 164-mile BRT network covering 26 major roadways. This was subsequently reduced by the MNCPPC Planning Board and County Council to 82 miles and ten routes. This has been further reduced for current planning and financing discussions to three routes (Rockville Pike, Viers Mill Road, and Colesville Road).

Several new members including Jim Zepp were added to the revived Task Force to slightly broaden its representation beyond various public officials and advocates for the BRT. Its purpose is to consider changes to the previously proposed ITA legislation that would improve its chances of passage, study other funding alternatives for the planned BRT routes, and provide some opportunities for public input on the proposed ITA and BRT funding. The Task Force or its two working groups met almost weekly with the goal of producing a final report to the County Executive by October 8, 2015.

Jerry Garson, the Montgomery County Civic Federation's Transportation Committee Chair and a CPA and RECA Treasurer), has calculated the likely impact on individual property tax bills for building the various BRT routes using the cost estimates for these projects submitted to the Council for the Countywide Transitway Functional Master Plan.

In an effort to reduce the figures for the three initial BRT routes from \$1.8 billion to \$1.6 billion, a subsequent cost estimate was prepared for the Transit Task Force which relies on measures such as cutting the number of BRT vehicles from 153 to 88 and shorten the Rockville Pike route by eliminating the section between Friendship Heights and the Bethesda Metro station. However, the reduced cost estimate is characterized as Phase 1 with no additional phases being specified at this time. The intention remains to eventually build all ten BRT routes. The total cost from 2016 to 2046 is listed as 5,7 Billion dollars. This amount includes repayment of principal and interest.

Since it is likely that the CCT will be included in the ITA's funding activities, the amount that the ITA will need to initially raise should be in the range of \$2 to \$3 billion, which would require a substantial increase in property or any other taxes that would be used as a revenue source. Other factors that could substantially increase these figures include:

- The related operational costs for these projects.
- The estimates are based on the MNCPPC recommended BRT configuration. The County Council changed some of the recommendations, e.g., the 4.5 miles of Colesville Road south of White Oak was switched from the BRTs traveling in mixed traffic which would have cost less to more expensive dedicated lanes.
- The estimates are only for the BRT-related construction costs. However, when the state "opens" a roadway for construction projects, it is now required to build what is termed "complete streets", which means that bike lanes and other pedestrian-related improvements must also be included.
- The VHB estimates do not include the cost of signal prioritization equipment that would increase BRT vehicle

speeds by giving them preference at signalized intersections and which are considered a necessary part of a BRT system. The Transit Task Force is currently considering modifications to the proposed ITA that may make it more acceptable to citizens and other groups while retaining its ability to impose additional billions in taxes to finance the various transit projects. As well as increasing property taxes, other revenue sources such as Federal or state funding, sales, excise, and payroll taxes are being discussed.

## Bilingual Voters Needed to Serve at the Polls for the 2016 Presidential Primary Election

The Montgomery County Board of Elections is seeking bilingual voters to work at early voting centers and at polling places on Election Day.

Because of the diversity within the county, the Montgomery County Board of Elections recruits workers who speak numerous languages. Voters who are fluent in both English and Spanish are especially needed in each polling place to meet Federal requirements of Section 203 of the 1975 Voting Rights Act which stipulates that bilingual Spanish speakers be available at the polls. Spanish speaking election judges are needed for both Early Voting, April 14 through 21, and Election Day, Tuesday, April 26, 2016.

The Election Law of Maryland requires that election judges are registered to vote in the State of Maryland, 17 years of age or older, and a U.S. citizen. Bilingual judges must also be able to speak, read, and write English. All election judges will be compensated for training and for Early Voting or Election Day service.



## **Road Safety Tips**

With school back in session and the nights gradually drawing in, we thought we'd provide you with some tips, courtesy of the County on road safety.

### **Tips for Pedestrians**

- Cross the street at marked crosswalks and intersections.
   Do NOT jaywalk.
- Stop and look every time before crossing streets, even when you have the right-of-way, and especially at intersections with "right turn on red."
- Before crossing, look left, right, and left again. Then look over your shoulder for turning vehicles.
- Make eye contact with drivers to make sure that they can see you. Never assume they do.
- Use pedestrian pushbuttons to activate or extend the walk signal.
- Begin crossing the street on the "Walk" signal never on a solid or flashing "Don't Walk" signal.
- Wear light-colored or reflective clothing to be visible after dark and in bad weather.
- Stop texting, talking on your cell phone, and remove headphones or earbuds when crossing the road. Put your cell phone in your pocket.
- Use sidewalks. If none, walk facing traffic so you see vehicles, and drivers see you.
- Watch out for trucks and busses backing out of parking spaces and driveways.

### **Tips for Drivers**

- Stop for pedestrians at marked and unmarked crosswalks. – it is the law! A pedestrian is in the crosswalk when their foot is placed on the painted roadway. If a car driving in front of you stops for a pedestrian in a crosswalk, you need to stop as well.
- Do not block crosswalks when stopping at intersections.
- Stay alert, slow down, pay attention and obey the posted speed limits, signs, signals and markings, particularly in residential areas, school zones and commercial areas. Young people are more vulnerable because they have not yet developed the ability to judge speed and distance.

- Always look out for pedestrians and cyclists, especially before turning at a green light or making a "right on red" or "left on green."
- Be careful when passing stopped vehicles. They might be stopping for pedestrians.
- Allow 3 feet when passing bicyclists.
- Share the road. It is your responsibility to look out for others.

## **Tips for Cyclists**

- Wear a properly fitted helmet. It can save your life.
- As a vehicle, you have the same rights and responsibilities as a motorist. Obey all traffic signals, signs and lane markings.
- Ride on the right side of the road with the flow of trafficnever against it.
- Pass slower moving or stopped vehicles on the left.
- Ride predictably and defensively. Use hand signals before turning.
- Stay visible, and use lights, reflectors and retro-reflective clothing when riding at night.
- Make eye contact with motorists and pedestrians before crossing paths with them.
- Always yield to pedestrians, even when turning, and especially at a "right turn on red" intersection.
- When cycling on sidewalks, always yield to pedestrians and give verbal warning when passing. Pass on left.

## Seven Locks Road to be Repaved

Beginning this month, Highway Services will repave **Seven Locks Road** from Tuckerman Lane to Democracy Boulevard. Staff will make full depth patches, mill the pavement, repave roads with hot mix asphalt and replace lane markings. The project will take about four weeks to complete, but schedules are dependent on weather conditions. Work hours will be weekdays between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. and between 8 p.m. and 5 a.m. Some Saturday work may be required.

## School is Back in Session – Be Sure to Stop for School Buses and Avoid a \$125 Ticket

Keep children who ride school buses safe. Under Maryland law, drivers travelling in both directions must stop and wait until a school bus's red lights stop flashing before proceeding. The only exception is on a divided highway of four lanes or more with a median separation, either a physical barrier or a wide space, such as a swale. In that case, only traffic following the bus must stop. Watch the video.




